

This Thanksgiving, cease the grease



Many of us are gearing up for marathon Thanksgiving cooking sessions. As you prep your turkey, potatoes, and pies, CFPUA reminds you to properly dispose of cooking oils and food scraps.

Fats, oils, and grease (FOG) pose a serious threat to our community's wastewater system. When these materials are poured down the drain, they congeal in sewer pipes and form blockages with debris like paper towels and sanitary products. This year, CFPUA has responded to several <u>sanitary sewer overflows in which FOG was a factor</u>.

Properly dispose of FOG by putting it in the trash. You can wait for oils to cool and pour them into a jar or other disposable receptacle. Wipe excess grease off of pots and plates before washing them in the sink. In addition, avoid putting these materials down your drain: dairy products, batters, dressings, frosting, peanut butter, and food scraps.

CFPUA donates laptops to help local students



Older CFPUA laptops are getting new life through a donation to <u>Communities in Schools – Cape Fear (CIS)</u>.

This month, CFPUA's IT Department donated 40 Dell and HP laptops to CIS. CIS works with public schools in the Cape Fear area to identify students at risk of dropping out, then connects then with resources to keep them engaged in school.

The laptops are all approximately 4 years old. IT staffers Scott Solari and Michael Rich (pictured above with CIS Executive Director Louise Hicks), securely wiped the laptops' hard drives in preparation for donation. Staff also installed Windows 10 Professional and completed all updates.

The laptops will go to CIS's Wilmington Youth Center for Inspiration, Recreation and Education (WIRE) in downtown Wilmington. WIRE provides tutoring and afterschool programing to local students.
