Automatic payment plans start next month

Starting in May, CFPUA will

automatically enroll some customers in 12-month, interest-free payment plans to help them catch up with outstanding water and sewer bills. To qualify for automatic payment plan enrollment, an account must be:

- Residential
- Delinquent by \$450 or more
- Delinquent by 60 days or more

In February 2020, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, CFPUA temporarily suspended late fees and service disconnections resulting from nonpayment. This ensured that no CFPUA residential customer would have water and sewer services disconnected due to nonpayment during the height of pandemic.

As CFPUA begins resuming normal operations, we are automatically enrolling some customers in payment plans to encourage them to begin bringing their accounts current.

Construction on track for new GAC filters







New filters to significantly reduce PFAS contaminants in raw water treated by CFPUA are getting closer to completion.

Crews continue to make progress on eight new Granular Activated Carbon (GAC) filters at CFPUA's Sweeney Water Treatment Plant, which sources water from the Cape Fear River and serves approximately 80 percent of CFPUA customers. Construction is currently underway on walls for the deep-bed filters.

GAC consists of tiny particles of carbon. It works through a process called adsorption, with a "d" as opposed to the more commonly known absorption, with a "b". Absorption is how a sponge works: Compounds you want to remove are distributed throughout the absorbing material. In adsorption, the compounds you want to remove bind to the surface molecules of the adsorbing

material.

GAC offers an astounding amount of surface area: One pound of GAC has more than 35 acres of surface – almost 100 football fields' worth. CFPUA's new filters will hold 3 million pounds of GAC – with a combined surface area that could nearly cover the entire state of North Carolina three tilmes over.

The project remains on schedule for the filters to come online in early 2022.



Dry April brings higher water demand

When to Water

To avoid over-watering, schedule irrigation based on whether your **address** is even- or odd-numbered.

Set sprinklers to run between midnight and 6 a.m.



April 2021 has been drier than normal, with about 1.3 inches less rainfall than an average April. Less rain means a higher demand on water systems as customers water their lawns and gardens.

To help conserve water year-round for drinking, firefighting, and other critical uses across our community, CFPUA recommends that customers follow the above schedule for outdoor irrigation. You'll avoid overwatering, keep your lawn healthy, and save water and money.
