

CFPUA asks State to prioritize study of hard-to-treat PFAS compounds

In October, CFPUA will mark one year of operating our new Granular Activated Carbon (GAC) filters at the Sweeney Water Treatment Plant. Thanks to these filters, CFPUA is now <u>easily meeting all proposed regulations for PFAS in drinking water</u>.

Using data and lessons learned in our first year of operating the GAC filters, we

are asking regulators at the State level for guidance on very small, difficult to treat PFAS compounds.

Since bringing the GAC filters online, CFPUA has seen some PFAS breaking through the filters, particularly two ultra-short-chain PFAS called PFMOAA and PFPrA. "Ultra-short-chain" refers to the number of carbon molecule chains in the PFAS compound, in this case three or fewer. There are no proposed state or federal regulations for these compounds, and health information is scant.

On August 24, <u>CFPUA sent a letter to the N.C. Department of Environmental Quality</u>, asking regulators to add PFPrA to a group of per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) the State has prioritized for study, including assessment of potential health risks. PFMOAA is already included on this list.

In addition, we're taking several other actions related to ultra-short-chain PFAS, including:

- Producing a white paper on PFPrA.
- Adjusting operations at the Sweeney Water Treatment Plant's GAC facility to further maximize effective PFAS removal.
- Evaluating other, novel treatment media, that potentially could be combined with the GAC to enhance PFAS treatment.
- Continuing to seek assistance from the State and academic researchers for up-to-date health and treatment information about the PFAS CFPUA treats.

All of these actions are <u>detailed at CFPUA.org</u>, where we will also post updates related to ultra-short-chain PFAS.

Bill Smith Joins CFPUA's Board
