have what's called a backflow prevention device or backflow assembly. This equipment keeps contaminants from your sprinklers or pool from flowing backward into the public water system.

You are responsible for having your backflow device tested annually and submitting your inspection report to CFPUA.

CFPUA's Economic Impact on our Region

Each year, CFPUA invests tens of millions of dollars to ensure families and businesses in our community have access to safe, reliable water and wastewater services.

This spending has impacts that reverberate beyond treatment plants, pipes, and pump stations, as detailed in a <u>recently released report</u>: "Economic Impacts of Cape Fear Public Utility Authority's Water and Wastewater Services and Infrastructure Investments."

The report analyzes changes in employment, economic output, and other economic activity in New Hanover County resulting from spending by CFPUA on water and wastewater infrastructure and operations, as well as the millions of dollars of economic output that would be lost each day from an extended disruption of water service. It examines economic growth in the region that also includes Brunswick and Pender counties facilitated by CFPUA's system investments and the water and wastewater services they support.

Key findings from the report include:

• Every \$1 million spent by CFPUA from 2013-2022 created an average of 10.7 jobs per year in New Hanover County.

 Over the same 10-year period, each \$1 spent by CFPUA generated a total of \$1.66 in economic output in the local economy as that spending rippled through various sectors.

Southside Project Awarded \$35M in State Loans



CFPUA has been awarded \$35 million in low-interest loans for the Southside Wastewater Treatment Plant Replacement Project, the biggest capital project in the organization's history.

The N.C. Department of Environmental Quality's (NCDEQ) Division of Water Infrastructure announced the loans this month. This was the second \$35 million loan that the Southside project has been awarded, for a total of \$70 million.

Opened in 1972, the Southside Plant is reaching the end of its useful life and is need of full replacement. This project will also expand the plant's treatment capacity from 12 million gallons per day (MGD) to 16 MGD, allowing it to stay ahead of growth across CFPUA's service area.

This month the CFPUA Board recognized New Hanover County's delegation to the N.C. General Assembly for members' work to support our region's utility infrastructure, water resources, and environment. The 2023 Appropriations Act allocated \$35 million to CFPUA, including \$17 million to support regional utility consolidation efforts and \$18 million to extend CFPUA water service to areas dealing with PFAS (per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances) contamination in private groundwater wells.
