Castle Street Intersection Closed for Utility Work

The intersection of Castle Street and South Fifth Avenue near downtown Wilmington will remain partially closed for two weeks while crews replace water and sewer mains.

Southside Wastewater Plant Replacement

The road closures are being completed in two phases, with crews first replacing utilities under the northbound lanes of South Fifth Avenue and then replacing utilities under the southbound lanes.

Through Sunday, March 9, the northbound lanes of Fifth Avenue between Queen Street and Castle Street will be closed. Then, starting Monday, March 10, crews will reopen the northbound lanes but close the southbound lanes between Castle Street and Queen Street. This closure is expected to remain in place through Sunday, March 16.

Through-traffic on Castle Street will not be allowed at the intersection with Fifth Avenue throughout the project. Drivers are asked to detour around the closures using Church Street and Queen Street.



Turning on Sprinklers? Don't Forget Your Backflow Device!

Spring is nearly here, which means homes and businesses will soon be turning on their sprinkler systems. Before you start up your irrigation system, don't forget to turn on your property's backflow device!

A backflow device, also known as a backflow prevention assembly, is installed between the public water system and your property's sprinklers, in-ground irrigation system, or swimming pool. In the event that water pressure suddenly drops in the area, due to a main break or system maintenance, the device prevents water from backflowing from your property into the public water supply.

Backflow can cause contaminants to reach our community's water system, so it's important to have your backflow device regularly tested to ensure it is function property.
